STRONG ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN 2017, DESPITE POLITICAL CHALLENGES

Because of past work and strategic focus, we are still making progress, leveraging your investment in Idaho's leading voice for conservation. Times are challenging for conservation. While headlines may focus on Twitter and high-profile missteps, key federal appointments with a passion and power are hard at work. An ICL role is to watchdog laws and protections—and we are doing this every day. ICL has always worked in a difficult political environment, so we're as prepared for today as anyone. Because of past work and strategic focus, we are still making progress, leveraging your investment in Idaho's leading voice for conservation.

ENERGY AND CLIMATE

While the United States became the only nation that is not part of the Paris Climate Accord, this November's climate

summit in Boise clearly demonstrated that the rest of the world is moving forward, especially businesses and nongovernmental organizations. In a big step toward weaning Idaho from coal, Idaho Power formalized its plan to divest from Nevada's North Valmy coal plant, saving ratepayers money and limiting greenhouse gases. In northern Idaho, ICL is working to convince Avista to similarly divest from Montana's Colstrip coal plant. Idaho is well on its way to coalfree electricity generation.

Also in the north, ICL opposed projects that would increase climate risk by expanding rail traffic across the Panhandle for oil and coal trains. The long-term risks were further demonstrated with a coal train derailment on the Clark Fork River.





Boise saw well-attended rallies at the Statehouse on both addressing climate change and protecting the role of science. People of all ages stood tall and reminded us of the power of the many standing together and of the energy of those who make these events possible. A former ICL board member reflected on the young leaders organizing the events, "This is why I teach."

PUBLIC LANDS AND WILDERNESS

From day one, 2017 was challenging for public lands. The public lands rally at the Idaho Statehouse in March gathered nearly 3,000. Inside, a chorus of "This Land is Your Land" started with a heartwarming choir of children under the Capitol dome.

A less touted piece to the 2015 Boulder-White Clouds wilderness bill was a provision for permanent retirement of public land grazing allotments. In the past year, with vital support from a third-party funder, ICL facilitated the permanent voluntary closure of several public land grazing allotments totaling more than

125,000 acres. Largely in vulnerable salmon and steelhead habitat, these areas will never again be grazed by livestock.

In 2017, ICL's wilderness stewardship program in the Sawtooth and three new Boulder-White Clouds wilderness areas grew to 25 volunteer steward groups leading 102 patrols to boost U.S. Forest Service maintenance efforts. This program provided more than 800 hours of support, cleanup and monitoring in these special parts of Idaho. ICL has also begun coordinating stewardship work in the Owyhee wilderness areas designated in 2009.

Efforts to designate wilderness in the Idaho Panhandle have long been underway. We believe a big step forward is close at hand with introduction of the Scotchman Peaks wilderness bill. U.S. Sen. Jim Risch's office held regional town meetings that were well attended by supporters, and we are hopeful that he will soon reintroduce a bill. This progress reflects great work by ICL's North Idaho team and our

partners—Friends of Scotchman Peaks Wilderness, Idaho Forest Group and others.

THE NIGHT SKY

A great deal of summer attention was focused upward as Idaho enjoyed totality of a rare solar eclipse. ICL provided safe viewing by distributing 8,000 pairs of certified eclipse glasses, including 5,000 pairs to schoolchildren in the zone of totality.

While eclipse totality might be a once-in-a-lifetime experience, in 2017, ICL worked on behalf of the Idaho night sky for all time. Light pollution not only makes it difficult for people to appreciate the Milky Way, it also affects the cycles that wildlife rely on for feeding, mating, sleeping and hiding from predators.

ICL collaborated with communities in Custer and Blaine counties, the Forest Service and others to secure designation of the nation's first dark sky reserve! The new designation recognizes night sky protections afforded by regional communities, major public land protections like the Sawtooth and Boulder-White Cloud wilderness areas, and citizen interest. This campaign reached beyond Idaho; in fact, our dark sky work was featured in the Washington Post, New York Times and other news outlets.

IDAHO'S WATER AND MINING

Often the most important water resource is the one we take for granted: water under ground. Across Idaho, used motor vehicle oil has been routinely dumped into purposefully built holes in the ground (called injection wells). Remarkably—and illegally—the state of Idaho has at least 50 injection wells that we know about. ICL made great progress this year in closing these wells and getting cleanup plans in place.

ICL has long led efforts to protect Idaho from impacts of mining, which can severely pollute Idaho's land and streams. Our

work addressed problems remaining from past mining, mines operating today, and a number of proposed mining projects. Much of our mining work is in close partnership with Bryan Hurlbutt with Advocates for the West. In September, we secured yet another court ruling against the Atlanta Gold Mine in the headwaters of the Boise River, this time a contempt of court ruling for the company's continued discharge of arsenic and other pollutants.

Not all mining work is adversarial. A productive partnership on the Blackfoot River continues where ICL, Trout Unlimited, Simplot, Agrium and Monsanto partner for significant voluntary habitat restoration in this important river system.

As part of our water protection, ICL published a first-ever report on the state of municipal wastewater facilities in Idaho, affectionately known as the "poo report." In Idaho, 81 percent of sewage

plants have violated the Clean Water Act within the last three years by not meeting the requirements of their permits; ten facilities accounted for 49 percent of all violations. This report enables us to focus our work where it's most needed.

GRASSROOTS POWER, INDIVIDUAL SUPPORT

ICL has historically created a community of conservationists to achieve its goals. In the past month, based on work we have seen from Patagonia and others, ICL added a new and powerful tool to amplify individual voices in the public process. Phone2Action allows us to link social media, various electronic outreach and old-fashioned organizing to build grassroots advocacy and power. You can now see new ways that ICL is helping you speak up for Idaho.

ICL's membership is well over 10,000, increasing more than 12 percent over

the previous year (which was also a good year). You—our members—are key to our success. An important metric in our work is our retention rate: that is, do ICL members stay with ICL? You do—thank you! We're proud to have a retention rate of nearly 90 percent, an exceptionally high rate for a nonprofit organization. We're also pleased with our new membership video and Wild Idaho podcast series, all available on our website.

A STRONG AND VIBRANT ICL

In 2017, ICL started the Emerging Leaders for Idaho's Environment (ELIE). This program, envisioned and run by a cohort of ICL's youngest staff, is an ambitious effort to empower other young leaders from across Idaho. The 18 ELIE members come from all parts of the state and are creating their own pathways to protecting Idaho and building a stronger ICL.

The fact that ICL is a well-run business underlies every ICL accomplishment. Our new director of finance and administration

is Julia Rundberg, who joins ICL with experience gained from the Idaho Botanical Garden, City Club of Boise and Land Trust of the Treasure Valley. As noted on page 18, Suki Molina, our deputy director, is retiring after 26 years. Our Central Idaho office gained a third staffer with Josh Johnson, and our development team brought on Haley Robinson. Aimee Moran, development director, left ICL this year to join the team at Boise State Public Radio. We will be hiring her replacement in 2018.

2017 also wrapped up our It's My ID campaign, a multiyear effort to increase financial stability for ICL. We're proud of our strong campaign finish (see pages 14–15), but most of all, we are tremendously grateful for the incredible support from you, our members, and for the leadership of campaign chair Elaine French.



Looking back at 2017, I commented to Rick Johnson that, despite challenging issues, a lot of "good stuff" got done. In his twenty plus years, he said that this is our "most effective staff, our strongest board, our best work."

True or not we need the strength of the staff, board, and all ICL members and supporters. The intent in Washington to roll back numerous environmental protections has energized our base. This engagment helps ICL remain committed, focused and optimistic.



HOW WE DID FINANCIALLY IN 2017

The Idaho Conservation League saw total revenues of \$2,846,905 for our 2017 fiscal year (10/1/16–9/30/17). Contributions from individuals included \$824,227 in annual giving, with the remainder coming in cash and pledges for the It's My ID campaign. This exciting campaign raised \$5,128,370 for our climate fund and endowment. Read more about It's My ID on pages 14–15.

Grant revenue was \$646,682, while special events and miscellaneous revenue totaled \$112,996.

To support our program work, we spent \$1,654,208, with administration costs coming in at \$124,234. Our fundraising expense of \$192,836 included It's My ID campaign expenses.

At fiscal year end, our endowment totaled \$2,772,309, with strong investment income of \$507,509.



A TREMENDOUS LEGACY FOR ICL

ICL dreamed of building up the cash coffers before some of the senior leaders... including me... strayed from ICL. Lo and behold, the It's My ID campaign was born in 2014!

It's My ID had two goals: double the ICL endowment and create a \$2 million fund to support our climate work for years to come. The climate goal concentrates on ICL's energy program, which deals with Idaho-based causes of climate change, as well as our water program, which focuses on water scarcity brought on by overuse and worsened by climate change. Clean, abundant water is no longer something we can take for granted.

Three years later, how did we do? ICL exceeded its \$4 million goal by 27 percent, securing over \$5,128,000 in cash and pledges! We're proud of this tremendous

EYES ON THE FUTURE

2018 will be another big year for ICL as we continue building our base of support, expanding our water and energy work and ensuring that ICL is organizationally prepared to meet challenges of the future.

Supported in part by the successful It's My ID campaign, ICL will be hard at work on a new, long-term commitment to restore the Snake River. While the upstream reaches include world-renowned trout waters, for two months this past summer, the state of Idaho advised citizens to not even touch the water far downstream, much less get into it. A complicated set of challenges lies between the upper and lower Idaho stretches, and ICL is building its capacity to address them.
