2019 was a busy year at ICL. After 24 years as executive director, Rick Johnson retired. ICL's board of directors unanimously elected me to serve as his successor. Leadership changes at not-for-profits, especially those that involve the departure of long tenured leaders, can be fraught with peril, but I believe we've successfully navigated this transition and continue to build a strong foundation for ICL's work.

As Idaho's leading voice for conservation, we feel

the urgency of the work we do to protect Idaho's environment. And, as I've stepped into this new role, I've wanted to be an agent of two seemingly opposing attributes: stability and change.

With your help, ICL has a strong track record of success.

- We have played leading roles in permanently protecting 795,000 acres of wilderness and 316 miles of wild and scenic rivers.
- ICL helped steer the creation of a statewide roadless policy that protects and guides the management of 9.3 million acres of Idaho backcountry.
- We have stopped coal-fired power plants from being built in Idaho and have caused Idaho's utilities to expedite the closure of the coal-fired power plants they own – putting Idaho on a path to fossil fuel-free electricity by 2045.
- ICL has strengthened Idaho laws and rules that protect air and water quality, and we have ensured that Idaho communities and industries adhere to standards in place to protect human health and the environment.

Through efforts large and small, ICL has done much to protect and restore the environment in all corners of a state with one of the highest population growth rates in the country.

To succeed, our work must continue to successfully navigate Idaho's ever changing political, economic and social landscape — continuing to do this is stability.

Pressures both nationally and here in Idaho make protecting Idaho's environment seem daunting; to succeed we will need to evolve and grow our organization — this is change.

This report gives you, our supporters, a snapshot of the work that we — you and the staff of the Idaho Conservation League — did together.

2019 was a year of stability and change and of great accomplishment.

A New Strategic Plan

The board and staff have been hard at work the last few months developing a new strategic plan for ICL for the next three years. We also reached out to our membership and past board members for their input. The process reflects the way ICL works — collaboratively, with active dialogue and discussions.

What is the point of a strategic plan? It provides a framework that reflects a shared (board, staff, members and supporters) vision of the organization's role, values and priorities. It is not a "static" plan, because, as we all know, changes can happen quickly and, often, unpredictably — so the plan must be flexible.

A changing climate impacts everything we do — the air we breathe, the water we drink and the land we love. So, climate change is woven through the four major campaigns of the strategic plan.

Our vision is an Idaho where public lands remain public and are well managed, air is clean, lakes and rivers are healthy, fish and wildlife thrive, and a prosperous, sustainable future exists for all Idahoans.

The four primary campaigns of ICL's new strategic plan are:

Making Idaho carbon neutral

Restoring Idaho's wild salmon and steelhead

Cleaning up the Snake River across southern Idaho

Ensuring landscape-level protection of public lands

These are ambitious goals that will take many years to achieve. ICL is charting a course to accomplish them. In addition to these four major campaigns, ICL will continue to work on a wide breadth of issues that do not fit neatly into these categories.

Additionally, the new strategic plan recognizes the important role of advocacy in achieving our goals. The new plan focuses on developing ways to recruit, educate, train and collaborate with conservation advocates — both locally and statewide. This is in addition to the work we continue to do with the legislature, local governments and agencies.

Finally, we have reviewed our operations in an effort to consistently and predictably increase funding and to upgrade and streamline our systems and processes. This will ensure that we continue to be efficient, effective and nimble.

Our success will depend, largely, on our ability to bring disparate groups, organizations and communities together to accomplish our shared goals. Our members, supporters and advocates will play a critical role in our success. We're all in this together!



A Focus on the Future: Four Big Goals and ICL's Plan of Action

As ICL's Executive Director Justin Hayes said in his introduction, 2019 was a year of stability and change. In order to continue to build on our stable track record of success and focus ICL's efforts on the most important conservation issues facing Idaho, we've changed the way we've organized our work.

As ICL's Board Chair Lori Gibson Banducci outlined, we now have four overarching campaigns with ambitious, but achievable long-term goals. Not all of the work that needs to be done in Idaho to protect the environment fits neatly into one of these campaigns. Consequently, ICL also engages in projects big and small to protect the environment from uniquely local impacts that threaten communities across Idaho, responds to unanticipated threats to the environment, and takes advantage of unexpected opportunities to advance our organizational goals. With that in mind, here are ICL's four major campaigns and the tactics we will use to achieve them.

Making Idaho Carbon Neutral

The amount of carbon humans release into the atmosphere is causing the world to warm at an alarming rate, changing weather patterns and the way of life for people and wildlife. We see these impacts today in Idaho both to our natural world through shrinking habitat and warming rivers, and to our communities as asthma rates increase and searing heat impacts all of us.

As an Idaho-based organization, ICL is committed to protecting our communities while reducing Idaho's contribution to this world-wide crisis. Our long-term goal is to make Idaho carbon neutral. We will accomplish this by helping Idahoans conserve energy and getting our utilities to divest from fossil fuel energy sources in exchange for renewables, encouraging the further adoption of electric vehicles and mass transit, and finding ways to reduce

agricultural methane emissions and promote the adoption of carbon sequestration practices. While these goals are ambitious, we are well on our way!

In 2019, Idaho Power, the state's largest utility, committed to clean energy by 2045 in great part due to ICL's continued advocacy at the Public Utilities Commission and the company's long-term planning process. ICL's advocacy also helped move Idaho Power to kick off 2020 by exiting the first of many Valmy coal units. What's more? By 2030, both Idaho Power and Avista Corp committed to be out of coal entirely!

2020 promises more success for this campaign. We are currently hiring our first ever Conservation Analyst; a position aimed at providing technical analysis to support not just continued movement toward clean energy, but also our work for more electric vehicles, mass transit and methane capture.

With your support, ICL's climate team is able to do what is required to attain these ambitious goals. We participate in meetings, research policies and economics, write comments and briefs, and educate and inform our members and the greater public about about how to make our collective voices heard on behalf of all Idahoans. Together, we will achieve a carbon-neutral Idaho.









Idaho has vast, prime salmon habitat that is nearly vacant because four federal dams downstream from Idaho in the state of Washington have made the fishes' migratory pathway to and from the ocean lethal. The loss of wild salmon to Idaho has catastrophic ecological and economic implications for the Clearwater and Salmon river ecosystems, and the fish, wildlife and people who call the Northwest home.


Our long-term goal is to restore ecologically significant, harvestable populations of wild salmon and steelhead to Idaho. We will do this by engaging supporters locally and regionally to build bipartisan support for wild salmon recovery that leads to a solution for a financially pressured Bonneville Power Administration (BPA) and supports removal of the four dams – an outcome experts say is necessary to restore our fish.

In great part because of ICL's groundwork, 2019 saw new and rejuvenated movement on salmon and



steelhead recovery. In addition to U.S. Rep. Mike Simpson announcing his commitment to saving the fish, Idaho's Governor Brad Little created a Salmon Recovery Task Force and invited ICL Executive Director Justin Hayes to be a member. Justin also participates in the regional Columbia Basin Partnership. These groups are both venues where diverse stakeholders come together to discuss solutions for recovering Idaho's fish.

ICL's staffing on this important work also grew in 2019. Emerald LaFortune became our Salmon and Steelhead Campaign Outreach Assistant; she works full time to educate and empower Idahoans to speak up for these imperiled species. Increasing our technical ability to analyze and use data to support this campaign, Mitch Cutter became ICL's Salmon and Steelhead Campaign Fellow. Mitch holds a two-year position and he'll analyze utility and water flow information to help inform possible policy solutions to save Idaho's fish.







Cleaning Up the Snake River Across Southern Idaho

In eastern Idaho, the Snake River is a blue-ribbon trout river. As it flows west, the river picks up so much pollution that, by the time it reaches Idaho's western border, it is so contaminated that the State of Idaho warns people not to fish in it or touch it, or let their pets swim in it.

In between, the river is heavily managed for people and agriculture. State law allows all of the water that reaches Milner Dam (located between Burley and Twin Falls) to be diverted out for industry and agricultural use, essentially drying up the largest river in Idaho. Over the last century, these low water flows coupled with unregulated pollution have contaminated many of the stretches of the Snake River in southern Idaho.

Our long-term goal is to make the Snake River across southern Idaho safe, fishable and swimmable again. This is yet another ambitious goal, but we have a concrete, achievable plan. We will focus on discharges to the Snake River. ICL will ensure the

enforcement of regulated pollution discharges and reduce the amount of unregulated agricultural surface runoff and nitrate-laden groundwater discharges.

To do this, we are building capacity to empower grassroots supporters to call on their elected and industry leaders for solutions to provide cleaner surface and groundwater in communities from Idaho Falls to Hells Canyon. We also seek to secure creation and implementation of a new mid-Snake water quality standard, known as the Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) pollution limit, with appropriately protective and stringent standards and instream flows.

In 2019, we actively participated in meetings regarding the mid-Snake TMDL. We held multiple public education events and hosted field trips with local stakeholders, including elected officials, media and interested citizens. And with your continued support, 2020 promises more time on the ground talking with stakeholders and decision-makers, helping to build the support to make the Snake River safe, swimmable and fishable again.

Ensuring Landscape-Level Protection of Public Lands

Approximately 70% of Idaho is publicly-owned. One of the primary reasons ICL was founded in 1973 was to be a voice for the land, water and wildlife that make Idaho so special.

Our long-term goal is landscape-level protections for public lands. Guarding against threats to sustainable management of large, connected landscapes is critical to protecting and restoring the ecological function of our public lands and the fish and wildlife that depend on them.

We use science, economics and collaboration to guide the sustainable management of large, connected landscapes. And we secure conservation benefits on public land via collaborative land management projects, supporting policies and actions that sequester carbon, and keeping public lands in public hands.

2019 was a busy year for Idaho's public lands and our public lands team. ICL staff commented on more than 100 projects and use permits; engaged with myriad mining companies in efforts to stop projects, protect species and/or ensure best practices; actively participated in person almost a dozen ongoing collaborative public land planning processes; and


our Central Idaho Wilderness Stewardship program continued to grow by leaps and bounds, connecting trained volunteers with land management needs.

We anticipate 2020 will be even busier. This winter, environmental analysis on Midas Gold's Stibnite gold project – an enormous proposed mining project in the headwaters of the East Fork of the South Fork Salmon River – will be released. Home to chinook salmon and other imperiled species, ICL will remain intensely engaged in the process.

ICL's Public Lands Director John Robison will continue to keep the "restoration" in forest restoration collaboratives, in great part via his role as the statewide conservation representative on Gov. Little's Shared Stewardship Advisory Council. Our Central Idaho Wilderness Stewards program will continue to grow. We'll continue to show up at collaboratives, working toward landscape and watershed protections that help ensure Idaho stays the wild Idaho that we know and love.

ICL and People Power: An Engagement and Communication Update

We've faced stiff headwinds
in the Idaho Legislature and
in Washington, D.C., we've
battled adversaries in court,
and we've worked with

Idahoans in unique communities and special places throughout our state to find common ground.

Faces may have changed, but one thing has remained constant...We are effective because of the engagement and support of our statewide network of members and allies. Through economic rollercoasters and political ups and downs, ICL and the community of Idaho's conservation advocates have stuck together, and we are stronger for it.

In 2019, we activated our members and supporters on dozens of issues. We continued to thwart the legislature's attempts to seize and control our public lands, we fended off efforts to undermine solar power at the Public Utilities Commission, and we trained and supported volunteers as on-theground stewards in Central Idaho's designated and recommended wilderness areas.

ICL members and supporters stood up, spoke up and took action. Together, we sent more than 12,000 emails to decision-makers and attended hundreds of events and hearings across our great state. And as we have done every year since

our founding, we spent countless hours watchdogging the Idaho Legislature from our office two blocks from the marbled halls of the Idaho Statehouse.

As we stand on the brink of a new decade, we continue to face serious challenges. The climate is changing, wild salmon and steelhead numbers are crashing, and Idaho's population growth is straining our infrastructure. In order to achieve continued success, we must reinvigorate our efforts to empower advocates and volunteers to create the public and political will to achieve our goals.

We've done this work well, but we must do even more.

That's why we've invested in new staff and resources to tackle these challenges. In 2019, we brought on a seasoned communications professional, Scott Ki. Together, we are targeting and reaching new audiences with our messages. We are increasing our media and public outreach, helping shape public policy and raising awareness. We also brought on new outreach and engagement staff in Central Idaho, on behalf of strategic priorities including restoring the Snake River and bringing back robust runs of salmon and steelhead.

We're excited about 2020 and invite you to recommit yourself to take action this year. After all, we can't do it alone...we never have.


